

It helped Poland defend itself from invaders (for example during the war against the Bolsheviks in 1920), when the advance of the Red Army westwards was arrested on its bank. It has also played a key economic role, since for centuries it was the main route for the grain trade, which in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries provided food for a considerable part of the continent. The outstanding and popular historian Andrzej Chwalba talks about the Vistula from various perspectives, including the ecological and cultural. It is, after all, one of the last large, unregulated European rivers, with an unique ecosystem and breathtaking landscape, which poets and painters down the ages have tried to depict in their works. We can gain much by looking at our present and past from the perspective of this river.





The other passengers on the Dunkerquoise, whose captain is the despotic Jean Beauregard, are the last Cathar woman, Lucjan the cat, the former King of Poland, John II Casimir Vasa, a missionary posing as a priest (Jean's brother), who, influenced by one of the women, converts to Catharism and yearns to create a pacifist vegan utopia on the island (and partly succeeds). The island becomes a Polish colony, and only then do truly bizarre things start happening...

After the war, she lived for many years in Poland, working as a costume and set designer in numerous European theaters and operas, and in film and television, after which she immigrated to the West, where she began a show business career. Watching Steven Spielberg's Schindler's List, she recognized herself as one of the child protagonists - a girl dressed in a red coat. This experience inspired her to write a bestselling autobiographical novel, The Girl in the Red Coat (translated into twenty-two languages, film adaptation rights sold to Hollywood), into which she put her memoirs from the war period, but also from the 1950s and 60s in Cracow's artistic milieu. Among the protagonists was her cousin, Roman Polański. She is also the author of novels including A Woman Traveling (2002), *Just Me* (2004), and four volumes of articles: *The Acquaintance in the Mirror* (2006), All for Love (2007), Sensitivity and Indifference (2009), The Moon over Taormina (2011), and The Good Child (2012). Her The Rose: Pictures and Words (2010) is a beautiful guide to her painting, published as an album.





It is often said of Lipska that she is the "twentieth century's last great female poet". That is doubtless true - she made her debut in the nineteen-sixties with the New Wave generation and followed with attention and anxiety the turbulent socio-political transformations of subsequent decades. But anyone who thinks she has nothing left to say about contemporary times would be in error.

The new book by the inestimable Ewa Lipska presents us with a very unlikely literary character, who loves his homeland, is fascinated by the world and likes to read unwritten books. Geldberg muses about the Church and the Edenic Diet he has begun, and also about royal funerals, which in unabashed fantasy he experiments with in front of the mirror. Each subsequent "variation" about him, occasionally astonishing and impacting on the reader with extraordinary force, remains endearingly honest, and the protagonist gains our sympathy, although actually we don't learn anything certain about him. For the question of who Geldberg is, is an open existential and philosophical question.





Terakowska has received many prestigious awards, including three from the Polish section of the IBBY. Her book entitled The Witch's Daughter was inscribed in 1994 on the Hans Christian Andersen Honorary List, and It has been taught in schools. Each of Terakowska's books has made a big impact, not only among the critics, but among readers in particular - and those of every age. Moreover, her books' popularity has not subsided, and are found on the bestseller list for years, and even more importantly - are counted among the classics of Polish literature.


